(“Every woman who has ever kept a diary knows that women write in diaries because things are not going right,” her foreword begins.) One of the fears that many black women writers have historically had is that if they reveal too much of their intimate lives, it could reflect badly, not only on themselves but on the black community. Centrally, many of the essays raise provocative questions about the feminist movement and women’s writing—the kinds of voices women have established in the wake of the demand for more writing by women, the politics of confession and the type of standards being set for women writers by critics.
