5 Grieving When caring for patients who have experienced a loss, facilitate the grief process by helping survivors feel the loss, express it, and move through their grief. Loss comes in many forms based on the values and priorities learned within a person's sphere of influence. Family sharing helps to develop and strengthen relationships within the family. 30 Care After Death Federal and state laws require institutions to: Request organ or tissue donation Perform an autopsy Certify and document the occurrence of a death Provide safe and appropriate postmortem care In accordance with federal law, a specially trained professional (e.g., transplant coordinator, social worker) makes requests for organ and tissue donation at the time of every death.
